Welcome to Modern World History at SES

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COURSE OVERVIEW

This year in Modern World History, you will study major turning points that shaped the modern world, from the late eighteenth century through the present, including the cause and course of the two world wars. We will trace the rise of democratic ideas and develop an understanding of the historical roots of current world issues, especially as they pertain to international relations. We will extrapolate from the American experience that democratic ideals are often achieved at a high price, remain vulnerable, and are not practiced everywhere in the world. You will develop an understanding of current world issues and relate them to their historical, geographic, political, economic, and cultural contexts. Also, we will consider multiple accounts of events in order to understand international relations from a variety of perspectives.

MATERIALS

Notebook: You are required to have a spiral notebook (sheets MUST BE 8¹/₂ x 11 inches) that you must bring to class <u>everyday</u>. You will record notes, complete assignments and paste worksheets and handouts in this notebook. It will become an ever-growing resource and study guide for this course. You will turn this notebook in, for a grade, several times throughout the semester. More details about your interactive notebook will come soon.

Journal: Students will be required to bring a composition notebook to class daily for journal exercises.

Textbook: The Holt *World History: Human Legacy* textbook is just one of many resources we will be using in this course. Students are responsible for this returning this textbook at the end of the year in a condition identical to its distribution condition, and will be held financially liable for lost or damaged books.

Additional Resources: Throughout this course, we will be analyzing documents, text and visuals from printed sources, speeches, radio and television broadcasts, the internet, as well as other resources.

SES Planner: Students will be required to write daily assignments in the planner provided by SES.

Required Materials: You are required to bring the following class everyday: notebook, journal, highlighter, <u>gluestick</u>, pencils, pens.

EXPECTATIONS

I expect that this classroom will be conducive to learning and open discussion for all. In order for this to happen, it is essential that the classroom be a safe and fun environment. To accomplish this, there are just a few important classroom rules:

Respect Others & Yourself – respect in the classroom will lead to a strong community. Disagree with Ideas, Not People – this is the foundation of open discussion. Be an Active Participant – participate by listening and contributing. Be Honest – lying turns small problems into big ones.

We will abide by all campus-wide policies and there will be **no food or drinks allowed** in the classroom, with the exception of clear or translucent water bottles.

ATTENDANCE

Everyday attendance to this class is mandatory. Being present and on time is an essential life skill and is expected of you in this class. You will be marked tardy if you are not in your assigned seat when the bell rings.

If you have an excused absence, it is **your responsibility** to make-up missed work or notes, and to pick up handouts or assignments – handouts can be found on the side counter filed by date, or downloaded and printed from the class website. You will be given one day for each day of an excused absence to make up missing work for full credit.

You may not make up work (including tests) missed due to an unexcused absence.

HOMEWORK

You will have homework nearly everyday. If there is not a regular assignment, you will be working on long-term projects or preparing for tests/quizzes. Depending on the assignment, homework may be turned in, or pasted in your interactive notebook as required by your instructor.

It is important that all work be turned in **on time**. Homework and notebooks are due at the beginning of the class period, before the bell rings to begin class, unless otherwise stated by your instructor. Homework or notebooks that are turned in late, including after the bell, will be subject to a 50% deduction in points. If you are tardy, your work will be counted at half credit upon your arrival.

GRADING

Students will be assessed in a variety of ways, including tests, quizzes, projects, presentations, essays, notebooks, and homework. Student scores will be updated on Zangle's ParentConnection on an ongoing basis, as well as posted in the room. Please note that student notebooks account for a large portion of assignments, and are collected/scored on a bi-monthly basis.

Grades will be posted and frequently updated.

- copying so many words or ideas from a source that it makes up the majority of your work, whether you give credit or not
